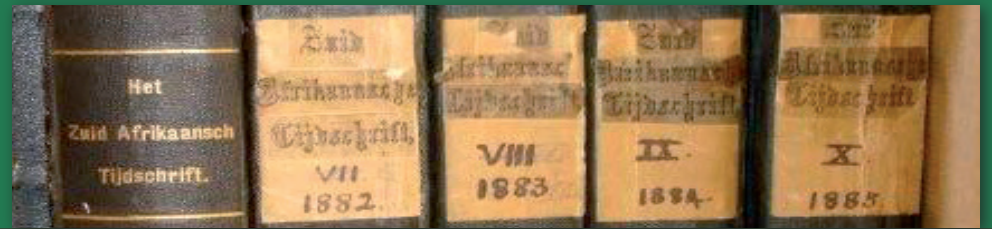

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Welcome to the CIE Heritage Day for South Africa

South Africa is the third of the eight priority countries for which the Centre for International Heritage Activities (CIE) is organizing a heritage day. In 2007, there were identical meetings on Indonesia and Surinam with about 90 participants attending.

Today, the CIE Heritage Day takes place at a very special location. The Hernhutter chapel of the Evangelical Brotherhood Community, where the morning programme will take place, has a direct connection with South Africa. In 1738, the first and oldest mission post in South Africa, called *Genadendal* (Valley of Grace), was established from the Hernhutter missionary movement. Today, a presentation on the heritage project in Genadendal will be given in the chapel.

The CIE also has its own contacts in South Africa. The Centre will coordinate a capacity building programme on Maritime Archaeology until 2011.

The Centre for International Heritage Activities is organizing these Heritage Meetings from the need for more coordination and coherence in mutual cultural heritage. The Ministry of Education, Culture and Science spoke about this urgent need three years ago and the particular initiatives of the CIE coincide with the intentions of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to make use of funds for the International Cultural policy in a more structural and strategic way.

Since its establishment in April 2006, the Centre has become a network organisation and resource facility for mutual cultural heritage and development.

There are many possibilities to upgrade heritage projects to a higher level, and make use of expertise.

Today, this South Africa Day is an opportunity to bring together participants and use this platform to share knowledge and experience. In the past months, activities concerning mutual heritage of the last ten years in South Africa have been listed. The inventory of these projects will be available through a database which contains the objectives, the aims, contents, the results of the organisations that have participated, and especially the expertise.

Many thanks to the Rijksdienst voor Archeologie, Cultuurlandschap en Monumenten (RACM) in Zeist for their cooperation and hospitality.

We would thus be able to inspire each other and to enhance and increase international cooperation.

In between the meetings there is time to meet people who are working in diverse projects. One could speak to various policy makers, to hear about the upcoming policy. In the mean time you could have a look at the poster presentations, where many important projects are being presented to the public.

The outcome of the workshops and the lectures presented during the morning will be sent to our Ministry of Education, Culture and Science. This will help our policy makers to develop a view on knowledge exchange on cultural heritage, with results directly from the field itself.

We hope with this day we can all contribute to the preservation of important tangible and intangible heritage in South Africa. And hope you will have a pleasant day with us.

Workshop descriptions

Built heritage

Chairman: Jean-Paul Corten, RACM

South Africa has a rich past of built heritage. The Cape Dutch architecture is the most visual, but obviously there are also monuments from the Boers period and there is built heritage from the Apartheid period. Much of this is linked to the Netherlands. This is evident concerning heritage from the VOC (Dutch period), but also from the many buildings designed by Dutch architects during the British period at the end of the nineteenth century and the Dutch-South African Railway Company, which built the railways.

The coordination on the area of heritage has two sides. There is, on the one hand, much demand for expertise and capacity building concerning restoration, and, from South Africa, this is a technical demand. Knowledge on Cape Dutch architecture is slowly disappearing from the country, and there are hardly any architects specialised in this field to be found. The expertise still exists in the Netherlands, and this provides an opportunity for working together.

On the other hand, this technical assistance is unable to be separated from the burden connected with this heritage. Many monuments still have signs of the colonial period, the Boer War and the Apartheid. South Africa is ready to adjust their monuments to the diversity of her population but will not be able to avoid the sometimes-painful history.

Municipal planology from the Apartheid point of view, such as the Six district in Cape Town is part of the South African past which still exists today and which needs a place in history.

Museum collections

Chair: Alex van Stipriaan Luiscius, KIT

The museum world in South Africa is in full activity. Exhibitions, document centres and new presentations are being set up and the digitalization of collections and new media under the full attention of the government and the museum world.

These developments in the museum world are clearly the result of a redefinition process which is taking place in South Africa. The democratisation of the society, under the motto of *redressing the imbalance*, is not only taking place in politics but also in the organizing committees of the museums. Museums are challenged to put forward the diversity of society. The aim is to let the museum staff as well as the museum visitor become a clear mirror of the South African society. There is, in the midst of the museological discussion on the role of museum the South African nation building process, a need for expertise and capacity building. For example, in the area of collection digitalisation and modern presentation techniques, an area where co-operation with the Netherlands is being looked for. There are some complicated questions on the technical assistance and museological perspectives.

Archives, books and photos

Chair: Frits van Dulm, CIE

Archives are a primary source for the history of all the South African populations. They provide elementary information on the origin of the South African society and provide insight into the role of South Africa as crossroads for international shipping traffic. The Dutch and South African institutes have invested greatly in the conservation and accessing of the VOC archives these past years. Besides the VOC-archives, much attention has been given in the past ten years to the Dutch anti-apartheids movement and the South African struggle against apartheid. Attention has moved from the slave

history to the migration history and the role of South Africa as crossroad between east and west.

The mutuality of mutual cultural heritage

Mutual Cultural Heritage is Dutch policy term which is used to indicate heritage abroad which has a Dutch connection. Dutch policy states that mutual cultural heritage is not only part of the Dutch history and identity, but also part of the history and identity of the countries where these remains are to be found, and is therefore termed mutual heritage. But do the South Africans see heritage that the Netherlands call mutual cultural heritage, as mutual heritage as well? What kind of interpretation do the South Africans give to this heritage? The VOC past, together with the VOC heritage cannot be dissociated from Apartheid. Especially, as in the case of Cape Castle, it played a prominent role in the period of the Apartheid. Does this mean that mutual cultural heritage cannot be dissociated with apartheid? How does this influence the cooperation between countries on the subject of mutual heritage? In short: **to what extent do we actually share common heritage?**

Afrikaans (Provisional)

Chair to be announced

Language is the bearer of culture and thus an important instrument for developing (cultural) identity. Afrikaans is intangible heritage which has been developed from seventeenth century Dutch and influenced by other languages such as Malayan and other African languages. Afrikaans was in the first place a contact language, a *lingua franca*. Afrikaans is still being spoken in South Africa, not only by the white people. The image of the language seems to have changed strongly the last years. It is no longer a language that is related to repression but now stands for self-obtained freedom.

However, Afrikaans seems to have come under pressure; the Afrikaanse Letterkundig Museum (Museum of Literature) in Bloemfontein is threatened with closure because of lack of subsidies. At universities, English is taking the place of Afrikaans more and more. Street and place names in Afrikaans are being exchanged for regional names. But there are also positive developments taking place from particular initiatives, and attention is focused on Afrikaans by way of festivals, theatre and music.

Internet based platform for cultural heritage projects

The Centre for International Heritage Activities offers technical assistance, heritage management and academic research. The international network is centred around an internet based platform, that CIE has developed. One of the components of this platform is a project database. This database was developed from the idea that much knowledge and information has been lost because people are not aware of what others are doing. Through this database, it is possible, with only a touch of a button, to get information on the heritage projects which have been carried out, those which are still on-going, and those for which plans are being made. Information on the aims, the contents, and the results of the projects are stored in this database. Moreover, the database also contains visual information, material about the involved organisations and especially, expertise advice.

It is a central location where all information on international heritage projects can be found and where communication with each other is possible. We think it is of great asset for a better coordination and contacts with all Dutch organisations involved.
